














Living Lab: "real-world environment where stakeholders (i.e. citizens, businesses, and researchers) collaborate to develop, test, and refine innovations for specific local challenges"

Lewis & Harris – a Living Lab experience



- Lewis & Harris suffers from outbreaks of scab, no different to mainland
- Crofting system and farm interconnectivity with reliance on common grazing means support is required
- With island nature, local scab control achievable, l

Impact: "the real-world difference research makes – changing lives, shaping policy, strengthening the economy, improving the environment, and enhancing health and wellbeing"

- Exemplar for PSF scheme increasing uptake and providing constructive feedback
